Description of change/improvement that would impact fair registration outcomes:

In the course of conducting its regular review of its policies and procedures, the College made a number of changes in 2021, designed to clarify and/or simplify its processes. These changes include the following: 1. The College introduced a new Application for Variation Guideline, specifically for members currently registered as Acupuncturists who want to become registered as TCM Practitioners. The Guideline lays out the requirements and the process, and is posted on the College's website for easy access. 2. To remain consistent with the College's bylaw, we updated the Annual Renewal Policy by changing the renewal deadline from April 1 to March 31. 3. We updated our Criminal Background Check Policy to include vulnerable sector searches as acceptable. 4. Our Refresher Program Guideline for Applicants was updated with additional courses that have been pre-approved by the College's Registration Committee 5. In response to the ongoing pandemic, the Registration Committee extended approval of interim changes originally introduced in 2020 regarding registration requirements and processes. These interim changes included: • Online didactic courses offered during the pandemic have been recognized (on an interim basis) as equivalent to classroom theoretical instruction, as described under section 9 of the Registration Regulation. Similarly, the online didactic courses offered during the pandemic have been accepted for the purpose of approving candidates for the Pan-Canadian Examinations (the registration examinations). • To be eligible to write the registration examinations, candidates must meet the education and supervised clinical training requirements. However, due to the pandemic, some students were not able to complete their clinical training before the examination application deadline, as normally required. CTCMPAO granted provisional approval to write the registration examinations to all students whose supervised clinical training was delayed because of COVID-19. This temporary exception allowed students to continue the process toward registration without delay.

Description of change/improvement that would impact fair registration outcomes:

The College did not introduce any new classes of certificates or licenses in 2021.

## Assessment of qualifications

#### Yes,

Description of change/improvement that would impact fair registration outcomes:

Ordinarily, candidates must have completed their educational programs, including their clinical training, in order to qualify for the entry-to-practice examinations. However, as noted above, on a temporary basis and in response to the pandemic, the College continued to allow applicants to sit their Pan-Canadian Examinations prior to having completed their required supervised clinical training. Apart from that, the criteria for assessing qualifications did not change.

Timelines for registration, decisions and/or responses

#### Yes,

Description of change/improvement that would impact fair registration outcomes:

In response to the ongoing pandemic, the Registration Committee extended the provisional approval to allow applicants to submit required documentation in electronic format. This interim provision eased the process for applicants and allowed them to gather and submit the necessary documentation more quickly. In so doing, it helped keep the timeline from initial application to final registration shorter than it otherwise would have been.

To lessen the financial burden on registrants during the pandemic, for 2021 the College reduced the annual registration renewal fee, lowering it from \$1300 to \$1000.

Several new resources were made available for applicants. We posted an Application for Title Variation Guideline on our website, to assist R.Ac registrants wishing to register with the R. Management attended the Canadian Network of Agencies for Regulation (CNAR) conference, as well as webinars hosted by the Council on Licensure, Enforcement and Regulation (CLEAR). All College staff members participated in training sessions on privacy and on sexual abuse, and in a session on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI).

Relationship with third party service provider(s)

Description of change/improvement that would impact fair registration outcomes:

The College has continued to work on strengthening its relationship with the Canadian Alliance of Regulatory Bodies of Traditional Chinese Medicine Practitioners and Acupuncturists (CARB-TCMPA). CARB administers the entry-to-practice examinations for Ontario and other jurisdictions, and is also working with us to develop an education program approval process. The College's relationship with CARB is collaborative and productive, and will continue to be important in helping the College to maintain fair registration processes and also to protect the public interest.

## Accreditation of educational programs

#### No.

Description of Change/Improvement that would impact Fair Registration Outcomes:

Accreditation of educational programs is not yet in place. However, one of the key activities identified in the College's Strategic Plan is to identify approval criteria for education programs to ensure that they adequately support the development of competent practitioners. In 2020, the College partnered with the Canadian Alliance of Regulatory Bodies of Traditional Chinese Medicine Practitioners and Acupuncturists (CARB-TCMPA) to initiate an accreditation program. This program is a collaborative initiative with other provincial regulators that will help the College form an education program approval process that will increase public confidence and further public safety. In 2021, CARB-TCMPA conducted a national consultation to solicit input on draft standards that were in development. Following the consultation, responses were reviewed by CARB-TCMPA, and an Accreditation Requirements Advisory Committee (ARAC). Revisions were made to the draft standards and a second consultation was sent out. The final standards were presented, and it was decided that consultations with each respective College Council be conducted to better understand how the project will be implemented. The program approval process continues in 2022 and beyond.

The College continued the online-proctored delivery format for the Pan-Canadian Examinations and the Safety and Jurisprudence tests, making them more accessible to applicants by not requiring them to travel to a test centre. Also, as previously noted, in 2021 the College continued accepting electronic document submissions from applicants, to mitigate challenges they might have otherwise faced due to pandemic-related restrictions.

We continued accepting electronic versions of supporting documents that accompanied applications for registration (eg school transcripts, proof of ID). This was a temporary change initiated at the onset of the pandemic to simplify and streamline the process for applicants. We continued this interim practice throughout 2021. Continuation of these measures made it easier for applicants to gather and submit the documentation required with every step of the application process.

The College moved from a single annual administration of the entry to practice examinations to a 2-session model, with exams now held in April and October. This new model gives candidates greater choice, and allows them to proceed toward registration more quickly.

The College maintained the online-proctored delivery format for examinations, which had been introduced in the previous year. Continuing this delivery format expanded accessibility of the exams for candidates and allowed them to move forward in the registration process, despite the restrictions that affected in-person examination centres.

To ease the challenges imposed on applicants by pandemic-related restrictions, on a temporary basis, the College permitted candidates to submit documentation electronically in support of their applications. Candidates were also permitted to sit the examinations prior to having completed the clinical component of their educational program. These temporary accommodations gave applicants greater flexibility in meeting the registration requirements under pandemic conditions.

The absence of accredited education programs adds complexity to the assessment of applicants' qualifications. The College has begun developing an accreditation process in collaboration with CARB-TCMPA. Once in place, the presence of approved education programs will help expedite the application review process and will help ensure that applicants have the necessary competencies.

The Registration Committee did not have publicmember appointees, so lacked the fulsome public voice that the Committee is expected to have. The College flagged the matter with the relevant government officials, emphasizing the need for public members to be appointed to Council.
